## IHHPA HALL OF FAME LUCILLE HOPKINS

Lucille Hopkins was born in Ottumwa, Iowa, and was married to Charlie Hopkins who played in the top class at the World Tournaments in 1952 and 1953.

Lucille was a charter member of the Iowa Hall of Fame. She was the Secretary Treasurer of the IHHPA from 1953 to 1973, (she signed Harold Garner's first membership card), and the Iowa State Fair Superintendent of Horseshoes until 1973.

Lucille was also actively involved with the sport of horseshoe pitching at the national level. She was a member of the NHPA Executive Council, and served as its 4<sup>th</sup> Vice President. In 1968 she received an NHPA Achievement Award. In 1996 she was elected to the National Hall of Fame as a promoter of the sport. Earl Winston called her "one of the pioneer women of horseshoes." Ottie Reno's American Directory of Horseshoe Pitching lists Lucille as a great worker and organizer on both the state and national levels.

Lucille and her husband, Charlie, were very much instrumental in keeping Jowa horseshoe pitching alive during the early 1960's. Lucille would send out the promotions and do all the necessary work to conduct several tournaments throughout the state. As a result of her efforts, she was responsible for about 85% of the horseshoe pitching in the state during those years. She would get everything ready for the State Tournament held each year during the Iowa State Fair.

Lucille would compile all the records from each tournament and forward the results to Ellis Cobb, editor of the *Horseshoe Digest* published in Aurora, Illinois. Red Henton referred to her as "Mrs. Horseshoe," and said she kept the sport alive in the State of Iowa.

The indoor courts in Ottumwa, Iowa were always well cared for and ready to go for the upcoming horseshoe tournaments, thanks to Lucille. Back then, the atmosphere was always professional (and full of men). During that time, Lucille would send out invitations to her courts.

On the day of the tournament, her paperwork would be in order, the courts were ready to go, and Lucille always made sure there were refreshments for her pitchers. She always had time to visit with the pitchers and their wives, check on how their families were doing, no matter how busy she might be at her work table.

Dean Carter recalled when, at one of the tournaments in Ottumwa, he suffered an injury to his ankle. Lucille insisted that he spend the night at their home and drive back to Council Bluffs the following day. Dean remembered Lucille as a very generous person, a loyal fan, and a great supporter for the sport of horseshoes. "I'm sure Lucille would be very pleasantly surprised today to see the number of females and young pitchers who are involved in the sport."

Lucille passed away on November 20, 1976. She is fondly remembered by those who had, the privilege to know her as a hard working, generous, and caring individual devoted to the sport of horseshoe pitching.

#### ATTENTION REGIONAL DIRECTORS, TOURNAMENT DIRECTORS, AND HORSESHOE PITCHERS

This is the first year in the history of the NHPA that all Sanctioned Events must be contested on Sanctioned Courts. Sanctioned Court Specifications and forms to be completed have been sent to all RD's, Tournament Directors and Officers. These forms are to be completed by the tournament director with the help of your RD. They should then be returned to NPHA Director C. Leo Buell. After corrections have been made to the courts (if any), Leo or a representative will come out and "recheck" your court complex. If all checks out, a Full-Sanctioned Certificate or a Conditional Certificate will be issued, whichever is the case. Tournaments that are scheduled for 2007 can be pitched on existing courts. In 2008, all sanctioned events must be pitched on sanctioned courts. The State Championship Tournament must be pitched on Full Sanctioned Courts. I ask that Directors and RD's check out your courts as soon as possible, weather permitting.

There are six (6) basic requirements for a Conditional Sanctioned Court Complex:

- 1. Are foul lines clearly visible and correctly marked at distances of 37 feet and 27 feet from the opposite stake?
- 2. Is the pit area centered between the pitching platforms, a minimum of 31 inches in width and minimum of 43 inches in length?
- 3. Are the stakes "solid," positioned correctly within the pit, and do they have a diameter of one inch?
- 4. Do stakes extend at least 14 inches but not more than 15 inches above the playing surface and do they have a three inch incline toward the opposite stake?
- 5. Does the pit contain clay, sand, dirt, or an NPHA approved synthetic substance, and in a sufficient amount to provide a depth of no less than 4 inches within the scoring area?
- 6. Is there a fence or protective barrier surrounding the courts?

Some courts will not meet the above requirements. I have heard some ask, "Who is going to pay for the upgrades?" If the courts are on public property, the City should be informed that the courts are not up to NHPA requirements. Explain to City officials what has to be done and that is their responsibility to bring the courts up to a Conditional Sanctioned Complex. Cities have tennis courts, ball fields and soccer complexes built to the requirement specifications, so why not the horseshoe complex.

#### Sanctioned Court Requirements (cont'd)

You may ask why all courts have to be sanctioned. There are two important reasons. The following are excerpts from the NHPA Chairman of RD's.

The first and most important reason is to standardize the conditions and results of play for everyone. Surely all of us can agree that the conditions of play do affect the results of play. If the stakes are short or loose, if pitching platforms are uneven, if short distance pitchers have to stand on the grass, etc., the scores are not going to be as high as if you pitched on courts that met these sanctioned requirements. It is these results that are sent into NatStats; results may not represent your true pitching ability. So if a competitor from another area seems to be "sandbagging," maybe it is not that at all; maybe it is that their lower NatStats percentage is a result from pitching on sub-standard courts. With everyone now competing on courts that have been sanctioned, the league and tournament results sent to NatStats will be more valid and the skill levels of your competitors in the future should be more equal. To accomplish this, we must make every effort to make the playing conditions on every court the same from one charter to the next.

The second reason has to do with membership. All of us have a special tournament that we simply won't miss. And yes, the main reason is often the people, our friends, as it should be. Or maybe it is the food or something else, but I often hear people say that they just "love those courts!" Maybe it is the playing conditions, the clay, or the walkways, or something else about the courts, but for whatever reason, it is the place where they love to go to pitch horseshoes. And if you check, these courts will very likely meet all the conditions of a Full Sanctioned Court. And also, is there a connection between the playing conditions and participation? Well, yes, I think there is!



# Horseshoes

hen I was growing up on the farm in the 1920s and 1930s, Sunday afternoons were a time for family, friends and horseshoes. My father and his friends were all lean and hard, working from sunup until sundown at least five-and-a-half days a week. They enjoyed recreation that was relaxing but still competitive. Horseshoes filled the bill. The way they played, it was a slow and easy game. When they were not actually pitching, they discussed everything that had happened on their farms all week.



Pitching horseshoes had the added advantage of being free. Everything needed to play the game was readily available on every farm; two iron stakes and a few horseshoes and they were in business.

Sundays always began the same way in our community. Everyone gathered at the little church in the morning. Afterward, two or three families, including the preacher, would come to one family's home (a different place each week) for a big Sunday dinner around a homemade dining table. When dinner was finished, the cowhide-bottomed chairs became lawn furniture. Everyone picked up a chair and carried it to the front porch or out into the yard under a big tree to sit in the shade.

Their low, comfortable conversation and occasional laughter provided background music for the games we children played. It was sheer contentment and peace.

After a while, one of the men would get up and

leisurely hammer an iron stake into the ground, step off 40 feet and hammer in another stake. In the meantime, someone else would get some horse-shoes, and the game was on.

They didn't worry about ruining the grass—there wasn't any. Our yard, like everyone else's, was hoed clean of grass and swept with a brush broom. The men played on hard-packed dirt.

They didn't bother with chairs, preferring to stand or squat as they awaited their turn to throw. Then, walking into position, they leaned over with

horseshoe in hand, sighted in on the other stake, swung the arm back and tossed. Swish ... clink ... "Ahaa ... ." That's the soft sound of horseshoes. Just as a baseball player has his favorite bat and the tennis player his favorite racket, each man has his favorite horseshoes, a pair perfectly balanced to his liking. Getting the horseshoes balanced just right before the toss was crucial.

They played without fanfare, cheerleaders or great crowds, but not without champions, even in our small community. The championship changed hands pretty often, though, for all these men were proficient in the game and able get five or more ringers in a row before losing

to get five or more ringers in a row before losing out to someone who was just as good.

The game started easy and it ended that way.

The game started easy and it ended that way. Toward the end of the long evening, as if by an unseen signal, they would pull up stakes, gather wives and children and head for home. All of them had a lot of chores to do. But they were rested and ready to get up Monday morning and begin another hard week. The popularity of pitching horseshoes declined during World War II. Small family farms and farming communities like ours almost disappeared as men and boys left for the service, or moved to large cities to work in defense plants.

However, the game is coming back. I make four reunions a year, and at each, we have horseshoe-pitching contests. We have trophies for doubles as well as single players. We have first- and second-place winners. Everyone has a lot of fun while we get to visit old friends and relatives. \*


